GENERAL RULES AND REGULATIONS

The following rules and regulations become a part of the contract of each exhibitor, licensee, concessionaire and every other person having contractual relations with the Fair. The Management of the 2023 Cumberland County Fair reserves the right to interpret all rules and regulations and resolve any situations, which may arise and are not restricted by the lack of or omission of a specific rule or regulation.

GENERAL RULES

- 1. The Management of the Cumberland County Fair reserves the right to rule on all questions not covered by these rules.
- 2. In the event of conflict between the General Rules and Special Rules, Special Rules will take precedence.
- 3. Disregard of any rule or misrepresentation by exhibitor or concessionaire forfeits all premiums, rights and privileges, without recourse.
- 4. Promiscuous or inappropriate advertising as is deemed such by the Fair Management is strictly prohibited. Exhibitors may advertise and distribute from their places of exhibit only. Tacking of signs on buildings or concessions is prohibited.
- 5. No peddling, hawking, or selling of any kind will be allowed in the buildings or on the grounds except by special permission obtained by Fair Management.

Premiums will be paid & exhibits picked up on Monday, September 11 from 9:00 am - 6:00 pm. PREMIUMS AND EXHIB-ITS NOT COLLECTED AT THIS TIME WILL BE FORFEITED BY THE EXHIBITOR. Exhibitors must have entry tags when picking exhibits.

Livestock pickup Sunday, September 10, 5:00 pm - 7:00 pm. Premium pickup at the same time.

- 6. Drunkenness, quarreling, or the use of profane or obscene language will not be allowed on the grounds.
- 7. The Fair will use every possible means to protect property, but will not be responsible for vehicles or parts of vehicles or articles left in vehicles.
- 8. No begging will be allowed on the Fairgrounds.
- 9. The solicitation of funds or the distribution of handbills, political literature, religious pamphlets, or any type of promotional material is prohibited on premises except advertising material which may be handed out from within rental space. No sale of items of any type is allowed on premises except for rented areas approved by Fair Management. No posting of signs or advertising material will be allowed on the building, fences, or grounds unless approved in writing by Fair Management.

ELIGIBILITY FOR PREMIUMS

- 1. Must be a resident of North Carolina.
- 2. Items must be entered in the name of the person producing them with the exception of special populations or groups representatives (example: schools, nursing homes, etc..).
- 3. Items must have been grown, made, or completed by the exhibitor after September 1, 2022. This ruling does not apply to livestock and antiques.
- 4. The same exhibit cannot compete for more than one premium (except for Best of Show). One person cannot enter more than one product in the same division.
- 5. Fair Management reserves the right to reject any entry offered.
- 6. No unworthy animal or exhibit will be awarded a premium.
- 7. No entry is entitled to exhibition space until proper entry has been made.
- 8. There will be a "Best of Show" award in the Youth Division (including 4-H entries) and the Adult Division.
- 9. One entry per category. Duplicate entries will not be accepted.

Limited Number of Youth Entries for 2023

4-H Cloverbuds, ages 5-7, and K-2 Youth are limited to 10 items.

Exhibit entries will be taken only for those categories listed in this publication. No additional categories will be added. Use this book as a guideline for entry categories.

ENTRY FORMS

- All entries must be original. No copies or fill-ins accepted. Only official printed forms may be submitted. A separate form must be used for each department, so please request an adequate number of entry blanks.
- 2. Fill out the application form completely and legibly. Complete address and phone number are required.
- Entries will not be changed except when improperly classed or an error made in copying original form. In such cases, changes will only be made by permission of the Extension agent in charge. Articles entered into wrong classes are to be reclassified at the discretion of the judges.
- Altered records or those not conforming to information on file are subject to prize payment being forfeited.
- 5. No entries accepted after deadline.
- 6. Child's age must be on entry form. 4-H age is based on child's age as of January 1 of the current year.

DIVISION CLASSIFICATION

May enter in only one of the following divisions.

- (ie. Must chose 4-H or Youth division, **NOT** both) **YOUTH** 4-H MEMBERS
 - ADULT SENIOR CITIZENS (62 and over)
- Youth are permitted to enter the ALL AGES and the ALL YOUTH categories. Adults and Senior Citizens may enter ALL AGES categories.

4-H Cloverbuds and K-2:

Youth ages 5-7 cannot compete against other entries. There is a limit of **10** items for 4-H Cloverbuds and K-2 entries with the exception of 4-H Project Expression Exhibits.

OTHER

- 1. Sole entries: Where there is only one competitor/or exhibit in a class, the judges will determine the premium to be awarded.
- Liability for loss or damage: Management will use diligence to insure the safety of all articles entered. However, no liability for replacement is intended or implied and under no circumstances will Management be responsible for loss due to theft, fires, lightning, wind, etc.
- Special livestock rules: Any animal not properly fitted will be rejected. PLEASE READ HEALTH RULES AND REGULATIONS CAREFULLY. There will be no exceptions. No unaltered males can be entered.

- 4. Care of exhibits: All livestock and/or exhibits must be cared for by the exhibitor. All stalls and pens will be well-bedded before the Fair begins.
- 5. Department rules: Rules listed with each department will take precedence over general rules. Management reserves the right to rule on questions not covered by these rules.

EXHIBITOR BOOTHS

1. Educational booths: Set-up dates for groups or organizations competing in the educational booths category are:

Exhibitor is responsible for obtaining entry form and entry tag on the day of set-up. Booths not tagged will not be eligible for judging.

2. Commercial Booths: Set up for groups or organizations that wish to rent commercial exhibit space is:

Rules and Regulations for Inside Exhibitors

The following rules and regulations shall be in effect, and will be strictly enforced, for all exhibitors participating in the 2019 Cumberland County Fair.

SET UP: August 30 - August 31: 9:00 am - 6:00pm

September 01: 9:00am – 4:00pm

Please pick up your registration packets with your booth number, admission passes, and parking passes at the registration desk upon arrival at the fair. Registration packets will not be available after 6:00 pm. Each exhibitor must be completely set up and ready for business no later than one hour before the fair opens on Friday, September 01, 2023. Additional admission passes may be purchased with cash, credit/debit card, or money order only (no checks) at the registration desk during set up. Each booth is 10' x 10'. One table and two chairs will be supplied to each booth if needed. Table coverings and skirting will be the responsibility of the exhibitor. The Fair reserves the right to place and relocate exhibitors where deemed appropriate. You will not be allowed to set up unless you have been approved with all balances paid in full.

PROHIBITED ITEMS:

Alcoholic beverages, concealed weapons or drugs are not permitted on Fair/Crown Complex property.

Exhibitors are not permitted to make sponsorship deals or agreements without approval of Fair.

Exhibitor operations must be confined to the boundaries of their rented space. You are not allowed to solicit anywhere outside your booth. You may only exhibit the items listed on the contract. Any violation will be subject to removal from the Fair without refund. No booth space may be sublet.

Individual PA systems are not allowed.

Unleashed pets / dogs are not permitted on the fairgrounds at any time. Only service dogs/animals are permitted on the fairgrounds.

UTILITIES / ELECTRIC: Electricity will be charged at the following rates: One outlet up to 30 amp.- Included with Booth Rental. Additional electric can be purchased. No electric cords or wires are to be run across pathways or walkways. All electrical equipment must be UL approved.

NOISE / NUANCES: Sirens, bells, amplifiers, flashing lights or any equipment causing annoyance is prohibited. Gasoline or propane generators will not be permitted to operate at the fair. Exhibitors will not be permitted to sell knives, stink bombs, silly string, or poppers.

TAXES, LICENSES & INSURANCE: It is the responsibility of the exhibitor to pay applicable federal, state, and county taxes and fees and for obtaining any required licenses or permits. Each exhibitor must furnish a Certificate of Insurance. Licensee shall obtain, at its own cost and expense, with insurance companies currently rated A VIII or better by Best's Key Rating Guide, commercial general liability insurance that insures all operations of Licensee contemplated by this Agreement. <u>Such insurance shall name Global Spectrum, L.P. and the Owner Cumberland</u> <u>County and the Cumberland County Civic Center Commission as additional insureds.</u> Such insurance shall be written with a limit of at least One Million Dollars (\$1,000,000) per occurrence combined single limit for bodily injury, property damage and personal injury. Licensee shall also maintain, at its own cost and expense, with insurance companies currently rated A VIII or better by Best's Key Rating Guide, commercial automobile liability insurance, including coverage for the operation of owned, leased, hired and non-owned vehicles, in the minimum amount of Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$500,000) per accident (PI and PD combined single limit). Such commercial general liability insurance shall be primary to and not contributory with any insurance coverage or self-insured program of Licensor. Licensee shall also maintain, at its own cost and expense, workers' compensation insurance in respect of all employees and any borrowed, leased or other person to whom such compensation may be payable by Licensee. Insurance may be purchased through the Cumberland County Fair at a rate of \$100.00.

HOURS OF OPERATION: All exhibitors with product sales must be open for business at the scheduled gate opening time each day and are required to remain open until at least one hour past the scheduled gate closing time for that day, unless otherwise authorized or directed by the fair. No booth can be covered or closed during fair operating hours.

PASSES: Each exhibitor and each of his/her employees is required to have an exhibitor admission pass to enter the fairgrounds each day. Each exhibitor will be furnished two (2) passes per booth which covers the duration of the Fair. Additional passes may be purchased during set up for a charge of \$35.00 per pass. The fair reserves the right to limit the number of passes issued for any exhibitor.

VEHICLE PASSES: Reserved exhibitor parking will be in a designated area by the Crown Arena. All vehicle passes must be hung on the rearview mirror.

UPS / DELIVERIES: Deliveries by UPS, Fed Ex, USPS, and other common carriers arrive throughout the day at the Crown Complex office. Please check with the office at 910 438-4100 or the Fair office at 910-438-4140 should you be expecting a delivery. The delivery address is 1960 Coliseum Drive, Fayetteville, NC 28306.

RV/CAMPER AND LIVE-IN STOCK TRUCKS: If you are interested in parking an RV/Camper on site during the Fair, please call the Fair office for details and rates.

ENFORCEMENT: Fair Management, without prior notice, may close any exhibit or booth or move out any tenant not operating in accordance with the provisions stated herein and/or signed the signed provisions, or if, in the sole discretion of Fair Management, the operation and/or presence of the booth is objectionable or not in the best interest of the Cumberland County Fair. Should exhibitor be removed from his/her space, no refunds will be given whatsoever.





No exhibitor will be allowed to make more than one (1) entry in any one class. Items must be ready for display. Small items must be on a six-inch plate and wrapped in clear plastic wrap. Cakes must be placed on a piece of heavy cardboard 6" x 10", which has been covered with foil. A hole must be punched in the cardboard so the entry tag can be tied through it. Due to storage conditions, the Fair cannot accept baked goods that need to be refrigerated. All baked goods become the property of the Fair. No commercial or purchased mixes allowed.





THE NATIONAL CODE OF SHOW RING ETHICS, AS ADOPTED BY THE INTERNATIONAL ASSOCATION OF FAIRS AND EX-POSITIONS WILL BE IN EFFECT DURING ALL LIVESTOCK SHOWS.

IMPORTANT NOTICE: ALL LIVESTOCK SHOWS WILL ADHERE TO THE COVID GUIDELINES THAT ARE IN PLACE AT THE TIME OF THE SHOW. THESE GUIDELINES WILL BE SHARED WITH ALL PARTICIPANTS PRIOR TO THE DATE OF THE SHOW.

INTERNATIONAL ASSOCIATION OF FAIRS & EXPOSITIONS (IAFE) NATIONAL CODE OF SHOW RING ETHICS

Exhibitors of animals at livestock shows shall at all times deport themselves with honesty and good sportsmanship. Their conduct in this competitive environment shall always reflect the highest standards of honor and dignity to promote the advancement of agricultural education. This code applies to junior as well as open class exhibitors who compete in structured classes of competition. This code applies to all livestock offered in any event at a livestock show. In addition to the "IAFE Code of Show Ring Ethics," fairs and livestock shows may have rules and regulations which they impose on the local, county, state, provincial, and national levels.

All youth leaders working with junior exhibitors are under an affirmative responsibility to do more than avoid improper conduct or questionable acts. Their moral values must be so certain and positive that those younger and more pliable will be influenced by their fine example. Owners, exhibitors, fitters, trainers, and absolutely responsible persons who violate the code of ethics will forfeit premiums, awards, and auction proceeds and shall be prohibited from future exhibition in accordance with the rules adopted by the respective fairs and livestock shows. Exhibitors who violate this code of ethics demean the integrity of all livestock exhibitors and should be prohibited from competition at all livestock shows in the United States and Canada.

The following is a list of guidelines for all exhibitors and all livestock in competitive events:

1. All exhibitors must present, upon request of fair and livestock show officials, proof of ownership, length of ownership, and age of all animals entered. Misrepresentation of ownership, age, or any facts relating thereto is prohibited.

2. Owners, exhibitors, fitters, trainers, or absolutely responsible persons shall provide animals health certificates from licensed veterinarians upon request by fair or livestock show officials.

3. Junior exhibitors are expected to care for and groom their animals while at fairs or livestock shows.

4. Animals shall be presented to show events where they will enter the food chain free of volatile drug residues. This act of entering an animal in a livestock show is the giving of consent by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainers and/or absolutely responsible person for show management to obtain any specimens of urine, saliva, blood, or other substances from the animal to be used in testing. Animals not entered in an event which culminates with the animal entering the food chain shall not be administered drugs from other than in accordance with applicable federal, state, and provincial statutes, regulations and rules. Livestock shall not be exhibited if the drugs administered in accordance with federal, state and provincial statutes, regulations and rules affect the animal's performance or appearance at the event. If the laboratory report on the analysis of saliva, urine, blood, or other sample taken from livestock indicates the presence of forbidden drugs or medication, this shall be prima facie evidence such substance has been administered to the animal either internally or externally. It is presumed that the sample of urine, saliva, blood, or other substance tested by the approved laboratory to which it is sent is the one taken from the animal in question, its integrity is preserved, all procedures of said collection and preservation transfer to the laboratory, and analysis of the sample are correct and accurate. The report received from the laboratory pertains to the sample taken from the animal in question and correctly reflects the condition of the animal at the time the sample was taken, with the burden on the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person to prove otherwise. At any time after an animal arrives on the fair or livestock show premises, all treatments involving the use of drugs and/or medications for the sole purpose of protecting the health of the animal shall be administered by a licensed veterinarian.

5. Any surgical procedure or injection of any foreign substance or drug or external application of any substance (irritant, counterirritant or similar substance) which could affect the animal's performance or alter its natural contour, confirmation, or appearance, except external applications of substances to the hoofs or horns of animals which affect appearance only, and except for surgical procedures performed by a duly licensed veterinarian for the sole purpose of protecting the health of the animal, is prohibited.

6. The use of showing and/or handling practices or devices, such as striking animals to cause swelling using electrical contrivance, or other similar practices are not acceptable and are prohibited.

7. Direct criticism or interference with the judge, fair or livestock show management, other exhibitors, breed representatives, or show official before, during, or after the competitive event is prohibited. In the furtherance of their official duty, all judges, fair and livestock show management, or other show officials shall be treated with courtesy, cooperation, and respect. No person shall direct abusive or threatening conduct toward them.

8. No owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person shall conspire with another person or persons to intentionally violate this code of ethics or knowingly contribute or cooperate with another person or persons either by affirmative action or inaction to violate this code of ethics. Violation of this rule shall subject such individual to disciplinary action.

9. The application of this code of ethics provides for absolute responsibility for an animal's condition by an owner, exhibitor, fitter, or participant whether or not he or she was actually instrumental in or had actual knowledge of the treatment of the animal in contravention of this code of ethics.

10. The act of entering an animal is the giving of consent by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person to have any disciplinary action taken by the fair or livestock show for violation of this Code of Show Ring Ethics and any other rules of competition of the fair or livestock show without recourse against the fair or livestock show. The act of entering an animal is the giving of consent that any proceedings or disciplinary action taken by the fair or livestock show may be published with the name of the violator or violators in any publication of the International Association of Fairs and Expositions, including Fairs and Expositions and any special notices to members.

11. The act of entering an animal in a fair or livestock show is the giving of verification by the owner, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person that he or she has read the IAFE National Code of Show Ring Ethics and understands the consequences of and penalties provided for actions prohibited by this code. It is further a consent that an action which contravenes these rules and is also in violation of federal, state, or provincial statutes, regulations, or rules may be released to appropriate law enforcement authorities with jurisdiction over such infractions.

General Rules - Applies to all Species

If an exhibitor has more than one entry per class, the additional animal must be shown by another youth exhibitor.

Exhibitors must show their own animal without assistance. For special accommodations please contact the Cumberland County Cooperative Extension office at (910)321-6862 at least seven (7) days in advance.

All decisions made by the judge will be **FINAL**.

Includes all exhibits pertaining to horses. Horse diseases and veterinary-related topics should be entered in Veterinary Science.

4-H903 Veterinary Science:

Includes exhibits relating to the biological aspects of animal health. This includes anatomy, physiology, pathology, sanitation and disease prevention of various animals.

4-H904 Aquatics and Marine Environment:

Includes exhibits focusing on the marine and aquatic environments. These could include topics on wetlands, reefs, coasts, bays, estuaries, rivers, lakes, ponds, and aquaculture as they relate to conservation, preservation and enhancement.

4-H905 Waste Management:

Includes exhibits relating to the management of solid and hazardous waste such as reducing, reusing, recycling, litter control and composting as a recycling/waste management process. (Use of composting in plant growth would be classified under Plant Connections.)

4-H906 Energy:

Includes exhibits that focus on sources, uses, conservation, and environmental impacts of energy. Topics could include electrical, solar, wind, geothermal, petroleum, and nuclear energies.

4-H907 Earth Connections:

Includes exhibits relating to the interdependence of air, earth, soil and water, which could include topics of natural resources conservation and ecology, water conservation and quality, soil science, geology, weather, the atmosphere and the stars.

4-H908 Aerospace Connections:

Includes exhibits relating to aerospace and aviation.

4-H909 Forestry and Wildlife:

Includes exhibits that focus on the forest ecosystems, forest conservation, and wildlife management.

4-H910 Entomology & Beekeeping:

Includes exhibits that focus on entomology and beekeeping relating to collection, preservation, biology, and control of insects.

4-H911 Plant Connections:

Includes all exhibits relating to production and marketing of fruits, vegetables, flowers, turf, ornamental, field crops and forage. Landscaping, greenhouses, propagation, soils, hanging baskets, bulbs, citrus, and harvesting or processing crops such as hay or silage are also included. Actual entries of farm produce, garden produce and floral arrangements should be entered under their respective general categories.

4-H912 Clothing & Appearance:

Includes exhibits relating to clothing selection & construction, buying, care, textiles, accessories and personal appearance and grooming. Constructed and decorated garments should be entered under their respective general categories.

4-H913 Consumer Education, Family Economics and Home Management:

Includes exhibits relating to comparison shopping, sales approaches, advertising, consumer rights and responsibilities, labeling, credit, money management, banking, investment savings, and time management.

4-H914 Food & Nutrition:

Includes all exhibits relating to nutrition that do <u>NOT</u> involve food preparation. Suggested topics include: nutrient needs, nutrition in the life cycle (e.g. for infants, teens, or older people), obesity, dietary guidelines, nutrition and fitness/sports, hunger and malnutrition, food labeling, cultural food patterns, vegetables, fruit, meat, poultry, fish, dairy foods or other foods and nutrition topics **not** involving food preparation.

4-H915 Food Science and Safety:

Includes all exhibits relating to food safety topics or food science. This could include such topics as vacuum packaging, food irradiation, pesticides, food additives, food preservation, and biotechnology in foods.

4-H916 Housing and Home Environment:

Includes exhibits relating to housing, home furnishings, and equipment selection, use and care of appliances, or energy efficient window treatments. Floral arrangements as a home furnishing accessory would be entered in this category.

4-H917 Human Development:

Includes exhibits relating to human growth, personality and character development and improved interpersonal relations. Example topics are: infant development, child development, baby-sitting, strong families, self-esteem, step-families, family communication, parent-adolescent communication, single-parent families, teen parents, coping with crises, marriage today, family forms today, adult children and aging.

4-H918 Health:

Includes all exhibits relating to general health education, coping with stress, first aid, CPR, substance abuse (drug, alcohol and tobacco), self-help skills, physical fitness, dental care, healthy lifestyles, sex education, immunizations, martial arts and prevention of disease.

4-H919 Safety:

Includes exhibits with a primary focus on unplanned or uncontrolled events, which usually produce unintended injury, death, or property damage. Includes accident prevention activities related to such things as machinery and equipment, vehicles, falls, swimming, animals, fires and burns, poisoning, firearms and electricity.

















4-H Project Expressions

4-H920 Science & Technology:

Includes exhibits relating to science, technology, engineering, and mathematics in general, bicycle maintenance and mechanical operations, automotive, aviation, electricity, electronics, computers, robotics, geospatial projects and Biotechnology.

4-H921 Petroleum Power and Small Engines:

Includes all exhibits relating to use and conservation of petroleum based fuels and the selection, care and operation of small engines.

4-H922 Career Exploration & Entrepreneurship:

Includes all exhibits relating to career exploration, job readiness, and creating your own business.

4-H923 Citizenship, Community Service and Leadership:

Includes all exhibits relating to citizenship, community pride and leadership. Examples include learning about the political process, becoming involved in policy making, through political or civic system, or addressing social problems, issues and/or challenges through leadership and volunteerism.

4-H924 Leisure Recreation:

Includes leisure activities such as cycling, skating, shooting sports, fishing, and music. Entries in the area of Arts and Crafts, handicrafts, woodworking, and floral arrangements should be entered under their respective general categories.

4-H925 Communication & Expressive Arts:

Includes exhibits relating to Creative and Performing Arts, Photography & Videography and Public Speaking.

4-H926 4-H Promotion Posters:

Includes posters that promote membership and interest in 4-H clubs and visibility of 4-H program activities. Posters can be NO LARGER THAN 14" x 22", and may NOT be 3 dimensional, and no copyrighted material (ex: Snoopy, Superman, etc.) is allowed.

4-H927 4-H State Theme Promotion Posters:

Posters that promote the current State 4-H Project Theme: **"4-H Grows Here".** Posters can be NO LARGER THAN 14" x 22", and may NOT be 3 dimensional, and no copyrighted material (ex: Snoopy, Superman, etc.) is allowed. Posters must have been displayed in public for a minimum of one week, prior to being entered in the Cumberland County Fair. Information concerning date and location of public display must be attached to the back side of the poster.

4-H928 General:

Includes all exhibits not related to any of the previously describe categories.
